Mercy Medicine Free Clinic is fortunate to have many diverse volunteers, or people who willingly donate their time and skills, doing everything from clerical and administrative work to providing certified nutrition, podiatric, and physical therapy evaluations. We collaborate with hearing aid specialists and mental health providers, too. If you are at all familiar with us, you already know that we have many collaborative partnerships with dental, pharmaceutical, and medical professionals who offer their services to our patients at no cost or for a discounted rate. These services are provided both in our building on Coit Street and in other locations in our area even during the COVID-19 pandemic.


Volunteers are also responsible for distributing free meals three times each


year. Made possible by donations of money and food from generous people with servants' hearts, one highlight of the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter seasons is a day leading up to each holiday when volunteers gather at the clinic to give out food to our patients. Either prepared as individual meals in take away boxes or as fixings to be cooked at home, up to 100 turkeys or hams with accompanying sides are available for Mercy Medicine patients to pick up. It is one way that we can show the love of Christ to people in a way that they can understand.

Sometimes God seems far away when we cannot feel His presence but we can help people experience Him in a way that makes a real difference. When Mercy Medicine is able to provide tangible services in the name of Christ, He uses us as a conduit of His love. All of what we do here is made possible because of the passion He has placed in the hearts of the givers, the prayer warriors, and the volunteers of Mercy Medicine Free Clinic.

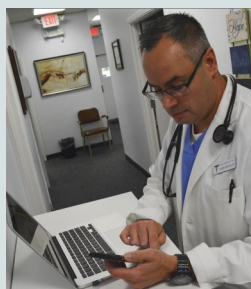

Palate Pleasers ... Frozen Date Delight

1 (8 1/2 oz.) can crushed pineapple
 1/4 c. pineapple juice
 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese
 2 Tbsp. sugar
 1/2 c. chopped pecans
 1 (8 oz.) pkg. dates, cut up
 1 c. whipping cream

Drain pineapple; reserve 1/4 cup juice. Gradually add juice to softened cheese. Beat until fluffy; add pineapple, nuts, and dates. Whip cream and fold into mixture. Pour in 8x8 inch pan or 8 small molds and freeze.

From the Director's Desk

One indicator of a healthy, forward-moving organization is its ability to grow and adapt to meet the needs of its customers in a positive, beneficial way. The Mercy staff, volunteers, and patients have witnessed this growth in the past eighteen months as several new clinical services have been added. Our patients can now be referred to in-house services such as physical therapy, nutrition counseling, and pain management. Mercy has also recently established a collaborative agreement with the McLeod Regional Medical Center Diabetic Center to provide counseling and life-style education programs to our diabetic patients in hopes of reversing the trajectory of this insidious disease.

The clinic has obtained the regular services of Pee Dee Mental Health through a program called "Highway to Hope." This new initiative provides "traveling" mental health professionals to key locations in the state to include the Pee Dee area. In our case, instead of counseling being rendered in a recreational vehicle, the Highway to Hope personnel have agreed to see our referred mental health related patients in our building every Monday morning.

This will allow prompt evaluation of a variety of mental health concerns such as depression, anxiety, bi-polar disorders, as well as quick referrals to Florence's substance abuse centers. These services will fill an important in-house care gap that has been lacking until now.

God continues to bless Mercy through these new, improved services. I am so glad that so many of you have chosen to also bless us through your continued gifts, time, and prayers! There is still more to come.

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Healthy Pursuit

This has been compounded by mandatory isolation since the pandemic began and no one knows exactly when our "normal" will return. That being said, it is as important as ever that we remind our friends and family how important they are and that they are loved.

One way we can encourage others is to call so we hear each other's voices. Another is to write a letter or send a card in the mail. Sometimes, knowing that you took the time to think about someone else can help alleviate a bit of despair.

Mental health is as important as physical health and is affected by any number of circumstances (such as loneliness, addiction, unexpected pregnancy, and abuse). It contributes to general wellbeing and even how quickly someone's body can heal.
